

CREATOR BIOS

Ted Mills has been making films since 1998, with the sci-fi epic and award-winning short, "nowhereland." Since then, he has returned with comedy films such as "Revenge of the Falcon" and his newest "Wallace Carothers." He has also directed music videos for Freezepop, Petracovich, and AM. A Santa Barbara native, he teaches film, writes on the arts and at the Contemporary Arts Forum has curated two festivals of animated music videos as well as a night of Super 8 film. At the Santa Barbara Museum of Art, he also curated the first North American retrospective of the work of Michel Gondry.

Robin Bisio's award winning dance films have been screened at film fest worldwide, including the last six years at the SBIFF, the Palm Springs International Short Film Fest, Dance on Camera, Danza di Napoli, Washougal, Columbia Gorge Film Fest, New Media Film Fest, Hollywood Short Pictures Film Fest, Chicks with Flicks, Wine Country Film Festival and many others. Her aim is to present an indigenous dance that celebrates the California landscape. She received the Santa Barbara Arts Fund Award for Choreography in 1995 and the Lifetime Achievement Award in Dance from the Santa Barbara Dance Alliance in 2010.
